(Douglas County, Ore.) <u>Douglas County COVID-19 Test Results</u>: Focus continues on our local COVID-19 response. As of 12:00 pm today, Friday, September 18, 2020, there are <u>THREE</u> people with new positive test results since our noon case update yesterday. However, please note that we have retracted ONE positive case number from our totals from yesterday. After investigation, we determined that one person with a positive test result is not a Douglas County resident, and therefor, the case was moved to their respective County. The chart below has been adjusted to reflect the retraction\*. Also, our numbers may differ from OHA's report until the case transfer process has been completed. The total number of cases (people with positive test results and presumptive) in Douglas County is now at 202\*\*. There are six hospitalized Douglas County COVID patients. One Douglas County patient is being hospitalized out-of-the-area, and the remaining five are being hospitalized locally.

**NOTICE:** Today brings more new cases to Douglas County. This brings our weekly total to 14, as of noon today. While we have been fortunate to have low numbers over the past month, we are experiencing an unfortunate spike in cases. In addition to dealing with COVID-19, we recognize that our residents, neighbors and friends are incredibly distracted, displaced and reeling from the devastating local wildfires, we are too. **But, we cannot lose sight of the fact that we are still in the midst of a global pandemic.** We continue to encourage you to stay vigilant in protecting you and your family from contracting or spreading this virus. Please continue to curb your travel, limit attending social gatherings, stay home if you are sick, wash your hands, stay six feet apart and wear a mask where recommended. Stopping the increase of COVID-19 cases in our county is really up to YOU, our residents. Please stay safe out there and remember to be kind to others.

#### AIR QUALITY UPDATE: AIR POLLUTION AT MODERATE LEVEL

Douglas County continues to experience fluctuations in air quality due to the local wildfires. However, current <u>Air Quality Index</u> (AQI) is now at 53 (PM2.5), which is at the lower end of the moderate level. In moderate level air quality, there still could be particulates, so if you are unusually sensitive to particle pollution, consider reducing your activity level or shorten the amount of time you are active outdoors. These are the best ways to reduce the amount of particle pollution from wildfire



























smoke you breathe into your lungs. We know that poor air quality can affect your overall health. It can cause chest pain, irregular heartbeat, shortness of breath, headaches, sore throat, coughing, runny nose and burning and eye irritation. DPHN put together a graphic (click here to view graphic) that will help residents understand the impact of wildfire smoke, poor air quality and COVID-19.

\*\*Our daily update includes the total number of cases in Douglas County, which combines people with positive test results and presumptives. We provide a breakout of the people with positive test results and presumptives in the chart above. Please note there will be times when a presumptive will move to a positive test result, and our total case number will not change because the case has already been counted, instead you will see an adjustment to our breakout numbers for positive test results and presumptives.

#### **OHA Definition for Recovered**

Previously, we used the OHA definition for recovered that considered people recovered if they were 10 days from onset and symptoms were improving. As more is learned about COVID, the clinical definition of recovery is evolving. Due to the evolving nature of this definition, we have removed the column in our chart listing our recovered cases. We added the number of those in isolation that roughly correlates with the number of active cases. The DCCRT noon case and daily update will report the Total Number of COVID-19 Cases, the number of positive test results (as of 12:00 pm that day), the number of presumptive, total currently hospitalized, total currently in isolation, total COVID-19 deaths and total negative test results in Douglas County. *Currently, DPHN is supporting 19 cases in isolation*.

#### **Getting Tested & Testing Clinics**

The next drive-through testing clinic is today, Friday, September 18, 2020, in Roseburg. As a reminder, if you are having symptoms of COVID-19 including cough, fever, shortness of breath, muscle aches and pains, diarrhea, sore throat or decreased sense of smell and taste, talk to your health care provider about being tested for COVID-19. Patients without a Primary Care Provider, that are looking for a COVID-19 test should contact the Sutherlin Aviva Health Clinic at (541) 459-3788. The first drive-through testing site was piloted in the county on March 17, 2020, there have been 1480 people tested in 71 drive-through clinics, while additional testing continues in hospitals, urgent cares and clinics. The drive-through clinics are led by DPHN, in conjunction with partner agencies including; Douglas County COVID-19 Response Team, Douglas County Board of Commissioners, Douglas County Sheriff's Office, Douglas County Public Works, local volunteers and local health professionals.

#### Oregon COVID-19 Case Update

Oregon Health Authority (OHA) reports new cases once a day on their website at <a href="www.healthoregon.org/coronavirus">www.healthoregon.org/coronavirus</a>. OHA also releases a daily situation status report and a weekly report that details the overall picture of the COVID-19 outbreak within our state. The daily report details positive and presumptive cases, as well as deaths by county and statewide, while the weekly report is more in depth and includes statistical data related the severity of cases by age, gender, zip codes, ethnicity, as well as information on workplace and senior care facility outbreaks in Oregon. #### **Oregon COVID-19 Case Update**

OHA expanded their reporting for COVID-19 case management to now include presumptive COVID-19 cases in their total case number. DPHN is reporting the number of people with new positive test results and any new presumptives and uses the OHA's definition of presumptive as having had close contact with a known, confirmed COVID-19 case, showing symptoms and not yet having a positive nasal swab/PCR or antigen test for COVID-19. Testing continues, as DPHN has been holding 2-3 clinics a week and hospitals, urgent cares and clinics continue to test. DPHN continues their epidemiologic investigations, identifying individuals who may have had close contact with individuals that have tested positive for COVID-19, advising and supporting quarantine and isolation.

#### Reminder: Limit Travel, Social Gatherings and Visitors

We will continue to encourage residents to be cautious about traveling or inviting people from outside our county, and instead encourage our residents to delay travel, consider stay-cations and reschedule visits from out-of-the-area friends and family to a later date. We continue to identify people with positive test results that have chosen to travel out of Oregon to visit relatives or to take vacations. While traveling those individuals and families have come in contact with someone with COVID-19 and brought it back to Douglas County. We have expanded our list of states directly related to our cases though travel, they include Alaska, Washington, California, Idaho, Nevada, Arizona, Texas, Louisiana, Florida, Tennessee, Michigan, Ohio, Massachusetts and Wyoming. A few other cases were the result of a family member coming to Douglas County to visit, brought the virus with them and infected their host family. In addition to limiting travel, we are asking that you also limit attending social gatherings, stay home if you are sick, wash your hands, stay six feet apart and wear a mask where recommended. Reversing the increase of COVID-19 cases in our county is really up to YOU, our residents.

### Do you have to quarantine or isolate because of COVID-19, but don't have paid time off?

Shared from the <u>Oregon Division of Consumer and Business Services</u>. The <u>COVID-19 Temporary Paid Leave Program</u> is available to people who need to quarantine or isolate because of COVID-19 exposure or are experiencing symptoms and need a medical diagnosis, but do not qualify for COVID-19-related paid sick leave (or do not have access to COVID-19-related

paid time off). If you meet all of the eligibility requirements, you will get a \$120 per-day payment, up to 10 working days (\$1,200 total) for the time you need to quarantine or isolate. To see if you are eligible, take this quiz or see the requirements listed below. Please read the instructions for help completing the application.

#### **COVID-19-Related Paid Sick Leave Eligibility Requirements:**

To be eligible for the program, you must meet all the following requirements:

- Work in Oregon and required to file an Oregon personal income tax return.
- Directed to quarantine by a local or tribal public health authority or health care provider because of exposure to someone infected or have COVID-19-related symptoms and are seeking a medical diagnosis.
- Not able to work (including telework) because you need to quarantine or isolate.
- Do not expect to earn more than \$60,000 individually or \$120,000 jointly in 2020.
- Your employer does not provide COVID-19-related paid sick leave or you have exhausted your available COVID-19-related paid sick leave.
- Are not applying for unemployment insurance benefits for the time off due to quarantine or isolation.
- Are not applying for workers' compensation benefits for the time off due to quarantine or isolation or experiencing COVID-19 symptoms.
- Are not seeking or using benefits from similar COVID-19 quarantine relief programs in Oregon or another state.
- Are not applying for or receiving other forms of paid leave from your employer during your quarantine or isolation, such as banked sick leave or vacation leave.
- Are not laid off or furloughed by your employer.
- Must have notified your employer that you need to quarantine or isolate.
- Can claim only one quarantine period.
